Just a Minute with... Pastor Mike

"I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, and I have remained faithful" NLT

It was Monday night, August 3, at the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona, Spain. At the track and field stadium the gun sounded for the 400-meter semifinals.

About 100 meters into the race Britain's Derek Redmond collapsed on the track with a torn right hamstring. Medical attendants rushed out to assist him but as they approached he waved them aside, struggled to his feet, and hopped in a desperate effort to reach his goal and finish the race.

Four years earlier he qualified for the 1988 Olympics in Seoul, Korea. Just seconds before his heat, he had to pull out of the race because of an Achilles tendon problem. Five surgeries followed. His goal of finishing an Olympic race drove him on and he qualified again for the 1992 Olympics. Now he was grimacing in pain again, this time holding his right hamstring.

But he said to himself, "I'm not quitting. I'm going to finish this race." He worked his way, hopping and crawling at times down the lane. His sights were set; the goal was still ahead of him.

Up in the stands a big guy wearing a T-shirt, sneakers, and a baseball cap jumped out of the stands. He hurled aside a security guard and ran to Derek's side. They embraced. He was Jim Redmond, Derek's father. Jim was a sports dad who changed his whole life for the sake of his son. He changed jobs. He moved cities to find the best training and dedicated his life to helping his son complete an Olympics race.

Now with Jim's arm around his son's waist and Derek's arm around his dad's shoulders and neck they hobbled down the Olympic track nursing a hamstring. Arm in arm. Derek's Mom and sister were watching the race back home on television. His sister was pregnant and went into false labor. Mom was weeping for her son and husband as they took each painful step on the track. In the stadium the crowd was standing and cheering. Derek and his dad worked their way around the track until they finally crossed the finish line arm in arm. Together they remained faithful to the goal.

If that's the way an earthly father responds to his son who is determined to finish the race, no matter what the price, how much more will your Heavenly Father run to you side, when by the power of the Holy Spirit, with a determined and confident faith you say, "I'm finishing. I don't care how much it hurts. I don't care what the cost. I'm finishing." We can and will finish through faith in the Resurrected Jesus! As the old hymn proclaims, "Because He lives, I can face tomorrow, because He lives all fear is gone, because I know He holds the future, and life is worth the living just because He lives!"

Paul knew that, without resurrection, the Christian life was a "Smells Like Teen Spirit" video.

Nirvana's "Smells Like Teen Spirit" is one of the greatest music videos ever. I have a strong 90s bias, but I believe it. Permit me to play the old man. Back in the day, we didn't have music videos on command. There was no YouTube. We had to watch them on MTV or VH1 at designated times, and we had to have cable to get them. I didn't have cable. I had network television (which thankfully included the Canadian channels). So I wasn't completely bored, but watching music videos was a big deal when I was with friends.

Grunge was a big deal. Alternative music was all about disillusionment. No one can say "whatever" like Gen X could say "whatever." I did a lot of the stupidest things in my life, some of them my fondest memories, to disillusionment anthems. Nirvana was peak grunge. In the video for "Smells Like Teen Spirit," Kurt Cobain and the guys are playing in a high school gym. It's a pep rally. Every-one is half-heartedly, ironically, going through the motions. The cheerleaders are trying, but to little effect. The janitor is into it, but few others. And then the song picks up and the disillusionment takes over. Everyone rocks out in "whatever" fashion. What did the lyrics mean? We didn't know. We liked that, too. It was perfect.

One of my favorite books of the Bible is Ecclesiastes. I'm sure part of the reason is the "whatever" vibes. Solomon knew what it was to be disillusioned. He'd tried everything, studied everything, experienced everything, at least he thought, and he found it all wanting. He began his book, "Vanity of vanities.... All is vanity" (Eccl. 1:2). Cue the power chords.

Gen X loved itself some disillusionment. We were ahead of our time. We couldn't have imagined, though, how quickly that music video would seem like hopeful nostalgia. Our western culture is one that's tried it all, studied it all, experienced it all, at least we think, and found it all wanting. Our cultures are tired, ironic, and disillusioned. If you didn't tell people it was from the Bible and cut it into short clips for social media, Ecclesiastes would be a huge hit.

A fulfilling life requires at least three things: source, meaning, and purpose. Without these three the only paths forward are living on borrowed philosophical and theological capital, not thinking about stuff too much (limiting ourselves to the material stuff of life), or admitting our dilemma and creating meaning and purpose on our own. The first approach doesn't last and the last two turn me in on myself and cut me off from my neighbor. People need source, meaning, and purpose.

Paul knew this. Paul knew that, without the resurrection, the Christian life was a "Smells Like Teen Spirit" video. He knew the temptation to disillusionment, and he thought such disillusionment was rational apart from Christ and Holy Week. He wrote to the Corinthians earlier in this chapter: "But if there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain" (1 Cor. 15:13-19).

Paul knew our need for God. He knew our need for God in Christ, crucified and risen, served in the person of our neighbor. He knew we needed something more than merely the present, the penultimate.

There are lots of beautiful assertions in the Bible, but today we have one of the most beautiful. Did you notice it? Here it is: "Your labor in the Lord is not in vain." (1 Cor. 15:58) Why is that? God has come in Christ. He's come to make the perishable imperishable. He's put death to death. He's taken away the sting of sin, silencing the accusations of the law. He's made all things new. He's made you new. And he's given us hope—sure and certain hope.

Your life isn't in vain. Your service isn't in vain. You're not in vain. Why? Because you're in Christ, your source, your meaning, and your purpose.

"Smells Like Teen Spirit" is a great song. I still rock out when it comes on. Make no mistake about it, however, disillusionment will never inspire as many great songs as hope, and there's no greater hope than what we have in the resurrected Christ. Kurt Cobain can't compete with Paul Gerhardt and the great lyricists of our Paschal Lamb. Whatever can't beat Alleluia:

> My heart for joy is springing and can no more be sad; My soul is filled with singing, sees only sunshine glad. The sun that cheers my spirit is Jesus Christ, my King; The heav'n I shall inherit makes me rejoice and sing (Christian Worship Hymnal 819).

HIDS IN THE DIVINE SERVICE

What is the "altar"?

When you walk into the

sanctuary, what is the first thing you notice? Maybe you see the beautiful stained glass windows. Maybe you noticed the candles. Of all the wonderful sights in our sanctuary, one thing probably comes to your attention first: the altar. The altar is the large, table-like object located directly in the center at the front of the building. The word "altar" comes from the Latin word "altare," which means "a place for offering sacrifices."

Why do we have an altar when we don't sacrifice anything on it?

It's kind of scary to think that we might use an altar for sacrifice. We look at the altar through the eyes of the Gospel. On the top of the altar are often carved five crosses — one for each of the five wounds of Christ. They mark this altar as a place where no more blood sacrifices will occur. The only sacrifice needed was made on the cross. The altar is a place where Christ gives out the forgiveness He earned for us through His death and resurrection. Wow, the altar sure is an important place!

Parents: During the service, direct your children's attention to the altar. Point out that during the Divine Service this is where God has promised to come to be with us. After the service, take your children up to the altar to observe. Remind them to be reverent in God's holy place.


That railing you see up near the altar is the altar rail. Some churches might even have a chancel rail a few steps away from the altar rail nearer to the congregation. **Does your church have both of these rails?**

What are these rails used for?

The chancel rail divides the church into two important parts: the "nave," which is the largest part of the church where the congregation sits; and the "chancel," which is the part of the church where the altar is located. The altar rail separates the altar from the rest of the chancel. It used to be, back in the Middle Ages, these rails were important for separating the congregation from the pastor or priest. As our understanding of the Lord's Supper changed, the rails began to be used for more practical purposes. They became helpful places for God's people to kneel and receive His wonderful gifts. They are also used for confirmation, marriages, and other events in the church.

Parents: Before or after the service, direct your children's attention to the chancel and altar rails. Allow them to walk up to the rails in order to get a better look. Encourage them to make the sign of the cross, kneel and pray. Remind them to be reverent in God's holy place.


