FROM PASTOR'S DESK



RED LETTER CHALLENGE

We're coming to the end of our 40-day Red Letter Challenge. Over the last several weeks, we've been immersed in Jesus' words (you know, the red letters in most Bibles), learning about how we can best follow Jesus by actually doing the things that he says we ought to be doing. It's been eye-opening and challenging, but I think it's fair to say that it has also done a lot to grow our faith and make us better disciples.

In some of the promotional materials for the Red Letter Challenge, I came across this wonderful quote:

“The best way to follow Jesus is simply to follow Jesus.”

It made me laugh out loud at first, but then it made me think. That's true, isn't it? We have been brought into this faith through the work of the Holy Spirit, who “calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian Church” (from the Small Catechism, explanation of the Third Article of the Apostles' Creed). But now that we know Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior, what do we *do* with that information? How does it change us?

That's been the real benefit, to me, of the Red Letter Challenge. It gave us practical ways to respond to this amazing gift of salvation by grace through faith in Jesus Christ. It showed us how the example that Jesus set in His own life can help us to be better followers in nurturing this gift and, ultimately, sharing it with others.

The five areas of our focus were Being, Forgiving, Serving, Giving, and Going. We talked about simply “being” in God's presence through Bible Study and devotion; realized that when we truly comprehend the gift of salvation and forgiveness, then we can't help but forgive others; we saw how our response to Jesus' love is to share that love through service; we understood that God's generosity with us – giving His only Son, who in turn gave His own life – opens up a well of generosity within us; and we saw how to share this gift with others as we live out our lives in this world.

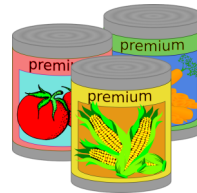

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Hello fellow members of Holy Trinity. I see they are predicting much cooler temperatures over the next few weeks. It's getting to be that time of the year when we will hopefully see the beauty of God's work during the fall months. I always like the radiant colors God provides in our trees and shrubs. Oh, and my garden will finally go to sleep until next year. PTL!

Speaking of next year, the upcoming November Voters Assembly will be dedicated to only two things—approving the budget for 2023 and the election of officers for the upcoming year. We have graciously received agreements from members of the congregation to fill most of the elected positions. However, for next year, we are trying to get additional help for the various ministry teams. As I mentioned last month in the Clarion, the work that the Trustees, Fellowship and Youth teams are responsible for is very large. So it is important for other NON-ELECTED members of the church to step forward and help these officers plan and complete the work that needs to be done here at Holy Trinity. So **PLEASE SAY YES** if you are asked to help one of these teams. Sharing the workload makes it much easier and more pleasant for all of us.

Now to the budget: We are anticipating increases in the budget due to general inflation and the addition of our new Assistant Pastor of Youth and Families. We have a pretty good idea of the increase for the new Pastor, which includes a substantial increase in the benefit package for all our called workers. However, we are not sure of the increase in utilities. From what I have seen in recent articles, we could expect somewhere between a 10-25% increase in gas, electricity, water, and sewer. That would be a large hit to our budget for next year. The Church Council is working diligently to address these concerns.

In the midst of all of this, I am reminded of a quote from Hudson Taylor who said, "God's work, done God's way, will never lack God's supply." How true that is. Instead of focusing on the increase, let's keep our eyes on Jesus and the wonderful opportunities he has given us here at Holy Trinity.

This is the last message you will have from me as my two-year term is expiring. I'm sure our new President will be able to keep you informed of some of the work that is going on here at our church through the Clarion articles. It has been my privilege and pleasure to serve you and the Lord as President for the last two years. But it is time for a change, and I know the Lord is preparing the heart of a new leader for this church. I will still be active, just not in the leadership role of President.

THANK YOU to all of you for your support. Keep it going as we still have much work to do. God bless all of you. God is good—all the time. All the time--God is good.

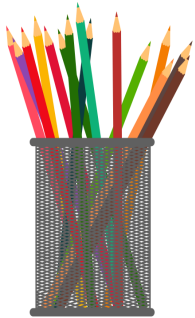

Thank you also to Matt Bolte who used a Thrivent Action Team to feed the volunteers on build day. 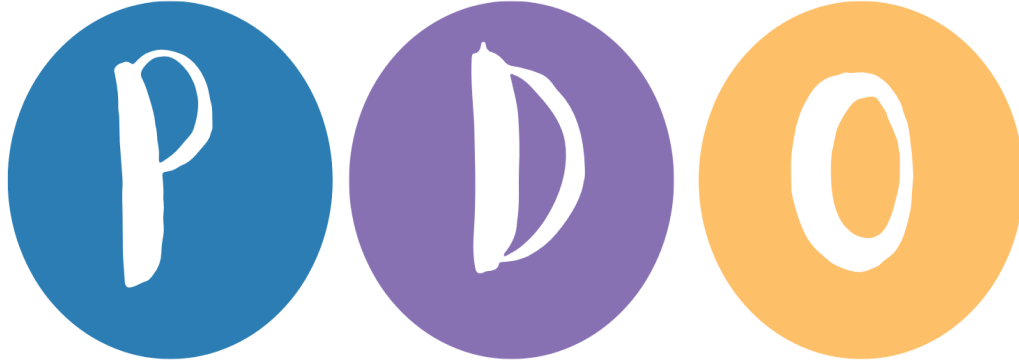


October was Pastor Appreciation Month!

What is Advent?

The church divides the year into different seasons that emphasize the life of Christ and the life of the church. Beginning on Sunday, November 27, 2022, we will enter the season of the church year called Advent. Advent is the season of preparation and anticipation leading up to Christmas, and continuing to Epiphany January 6, 2023.

The focus of Advent is two-fold. On the one hand, we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who came into the world as both God and Man so that our sins might be forgiven. On the other hand, we anticipate the day when Jesus will return to Earth and bring an end to this world. Those will be scary days, but we can look forward to the end of the world with hope because through faith in Jesus, the end of this world will mean the beginning of a new life with Christ for eternity.

Advent, then, is a time for us to repent and believe. Knowing that Jesus was born to forgive our sins, we repent (admit our failures to God) and believe that we are forgiven because of the death and resurrection of Jesus on our behalf. Also, knowing



In Celebration of All Saints Day

On this day, the church remembers all the saints who have gone before us.

The Christian church year is rife with days set aside to commemorate the saints, but All Saints Day, celebrated on the first of November, heaps them together. On this day, the church remembers all the saints who have gone before us. It celebrates the fact that there is one Church united, those in heaven who await our appearance, and those of us on earth who look forward to that glad reunion. What comes to mind when you hear the mention of a saint? I grew up in the Roman Catholic Church. In my youth, if you would have asked me what or who a saint is, the first thing that would have come to mind was a very holy person, someone whose holiness had been noticed by the church, someone worthy of a statue in the sanctuary. I would have thought of someone who set a great example, accomplished some great spiritual feat, did some amazingly good deed, or went to the ends of the earth to convert some great number of people. What about you? What comes to mind when you hear the word saint? Protestants have a strange relationship with the saints. We have churches named after saints, but most of them are named after people from the Bible. In Scripture readings and sermons, we often commemorate saints and minor festivals dot the landscape of the liturgical year. Sometimes we put the title "Saint" before someone's name, almost always someone from history and from way-back history at that. For even many Protestants, the term saint can be nebulous or simply inaccurate. So what is a saint? Who is a saint? Your answer reveals a lot, and God's answer reveals even more. Think about it for a moment. If a friend asked you, how would define this very Christian word? It might be harder than one might expect given the number of times it appears in the Scriptures and in our regular speech. Imagine a friend told you about someone at their job or school and said, "she's a saint." What would you think about that person? We'd assume she was extremely nice, right? We'd think she was easy to get along with, went above and beyond in her work, looked out for others, and stuff like that. We would equate the term with lawful actions or good behavior. I think it's fair to say that's how we use the term pretty commonly both in the church and outside of it.

Are you a saint? Would you object if someone said you were, maybe blush, maybe put up an argument in humility? Deep down, as much as it might stroke your ego to have someone call you a saint, you would assume if they only knew the real you, they would never use such a term. It is a fortunate thing our thoughts don't scroll across our heads, and that our secrets remain secret. It's how we keep up appearance. But are you a saint? I'm not asking about appearance, either. Are you a saint? God's answer is clear. You don't need to look any farther than your Baptism. In Christ, you are a saint. How can this be? It can be because a saint isn't a Law title, a title about what you do. Instead, it is a grace title, a gospel title, a title about what God has done for you...God has declared you a saint. By grace, through faith, He has declared you innocent in His sight, holy. Your righteousness isn't your own, not in origin, but it is yours as a gift. You are as much a saint as any other, even the famous ones from the Bible. Their Jesus is your Jesus and so sainthood knows no levels in Christ.

That's not how we often think of saints. That's not how we imagine holiness works. Perhaps God's holiness imputed to us even seems too easy, not enough. But it's more than enough because it's more than we can do or earn and it's from God and only from Him. His imputed righteousness grants rest for those weary from working, peace for those frantic with false piety, hope for those despairing of their own ability to measure up or flip the script of their life. In Christ, by grace, through faith, we all can rejoice to be saints of God, canonized in His wounds.

St. Peter denied Christ. Christ found Him, restored Him, sainted Him. He did the same with Moses the murderer, Paul the persecutor, Martha the worrier, Mary Magdalene the demon – possessed, and every other baptized – sainted – Christian.

The first of November is All Saints Day. Celebrate it as a saint. Give thanks for all the sinners declared saints before you. Rejoice that the same Word that bespoke them saints is still speaking, still canonizing sinners in Christ who rose for our justification and whose righteousness is our robe, the source of our sainthood. Take heart, too, that because this title isn't from you but is a gift, it is as sure and certain as its Giver, the One to whom all the saints of every age point and in whom they live and move and have their being. Try it on for size and wear it well, for it won't ever wear out. It's as eternal as the One who gave it to you.

What is the “Sunday of the Fulfillment”?

The Sunday of the Fulfillment, which is the last Sunday in the Church Year, is the day we celebrate and look forward to the coming of our Lord Jesus on the Last Day in time.

Why do we celebrate it?

Have you ever had to wait for a really exciting gift that you’ve always wanted? What was it like when you finally received the gift? The waiting may have been difficult, but when you finally received the gift, it made all of the waiting seem “fulfilled” or complete. As Christians, we are eagerly waiting for our Lord Jesus to return. When he returns, as Scripture says, He will take His people to be with Him in His glorious Kingdom forever. Now that is something to celebrate and be excited about!



Parents: At home, discuss with your children what will happen when Jesus returns. Take time to read through portions of Matthew 24 and 25. Remind them that in Baptism Jesus makes us His people. Through faith in Him, we live as Christians patiently awaiting His return.

What is “All Saints’ Day”?

All Saints’ Day is the day during the Church Year that we celebrate, remember and honor all of those who have died with faith in Jesus and are now with Him in heaven.

Why do we celebrate All Saints’ Day?

The word “saint” comes from the Latin word *sanctus* which means “holy” or “sacred.” Saints are God’s holy people. We thank God for the saints who have gone before us because of their great example of faith and God’s great mercy in their lives!

Do you have to die to be a saint?

No way! All of God’s faithful people are His saints! We were washed clean of our sins at our Baptism and made holy before God. That’s what it means when we hear God’s Word say: “These are the ones coming out of the great tribulation. They have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb” (Rev. 7:14). Isn’t it great to know that it is not what we have done that makes us a saint, but what Jesus has done for us through His death and resurrection? He gives all of this to us through Baptism. He is the one who makes us a saint!



Parents: Talk to your children about those in your own family who have died in the faith. Explain that they are now with Jesus in heaven. Remind them that this is a fulfillment of God’s promises at our Baptism.

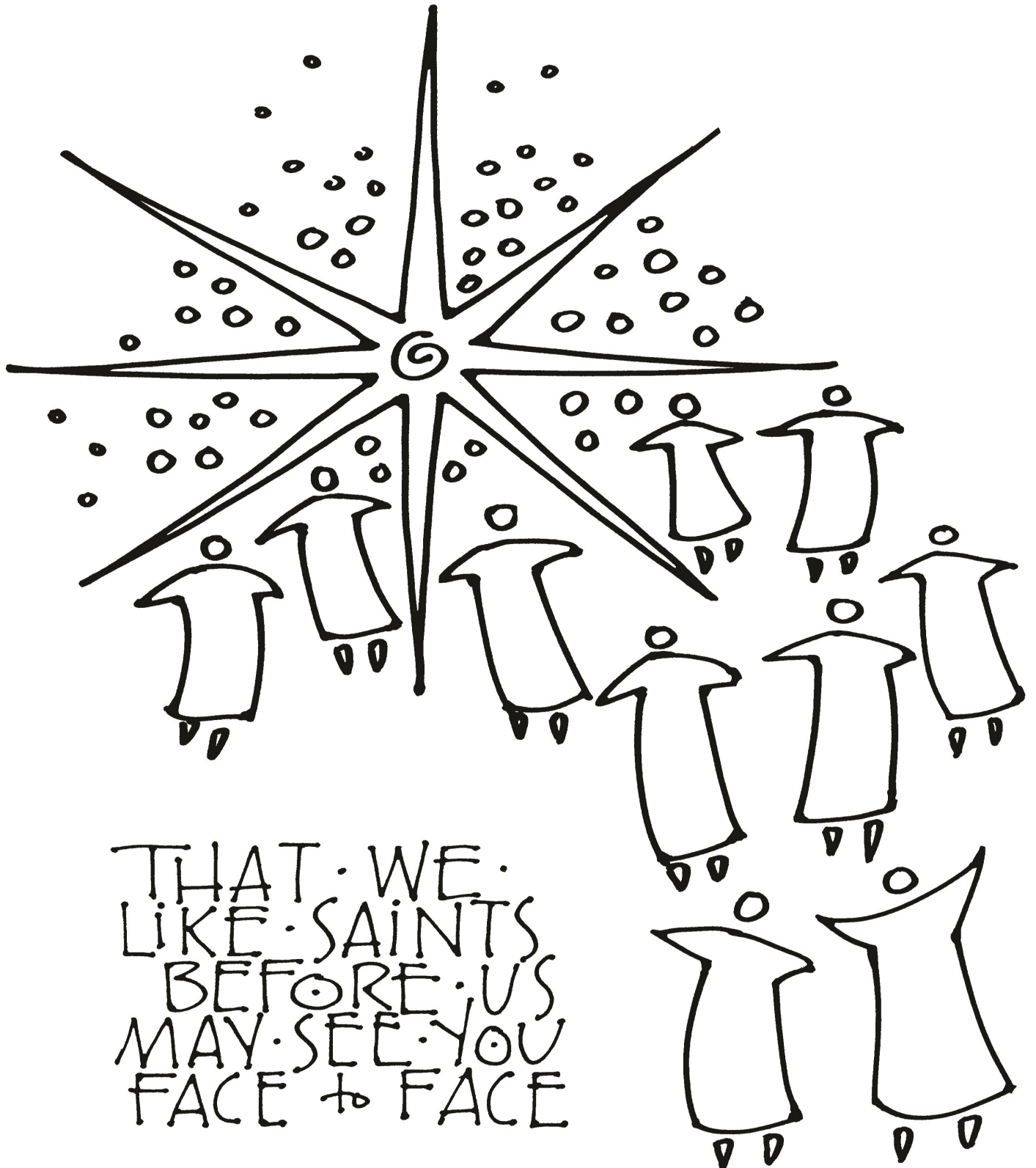

What is Advent?

Advent marks the beginning of the Church Year. Advent is made up of the four Sundays that come right before Christmas. In other words, the deeper into Advent you go, the closer you get to Christmas Day. For Christians, the First Sunday in Advent is kind of like the “New Year’s Day” of the Church Year calendar.

Why do we celebrate Advent?

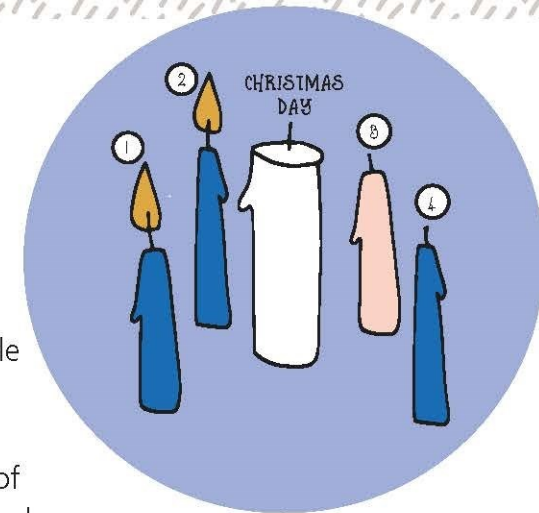
The word Advent means “coming.” During Advent, we prepare for the coming of the One who was born that first Christmas in a stable. We prepare for the One who saved us from sin, death and the power of the devil: our Lord Jesus Christ! What a wonderful and exciting time of preparation!



Parents:

At home, in order to help your children better prepare for the birth of Jesus, try using an Advent devotional booklet provided by the church for family devotions.

What is the Advent wreath?

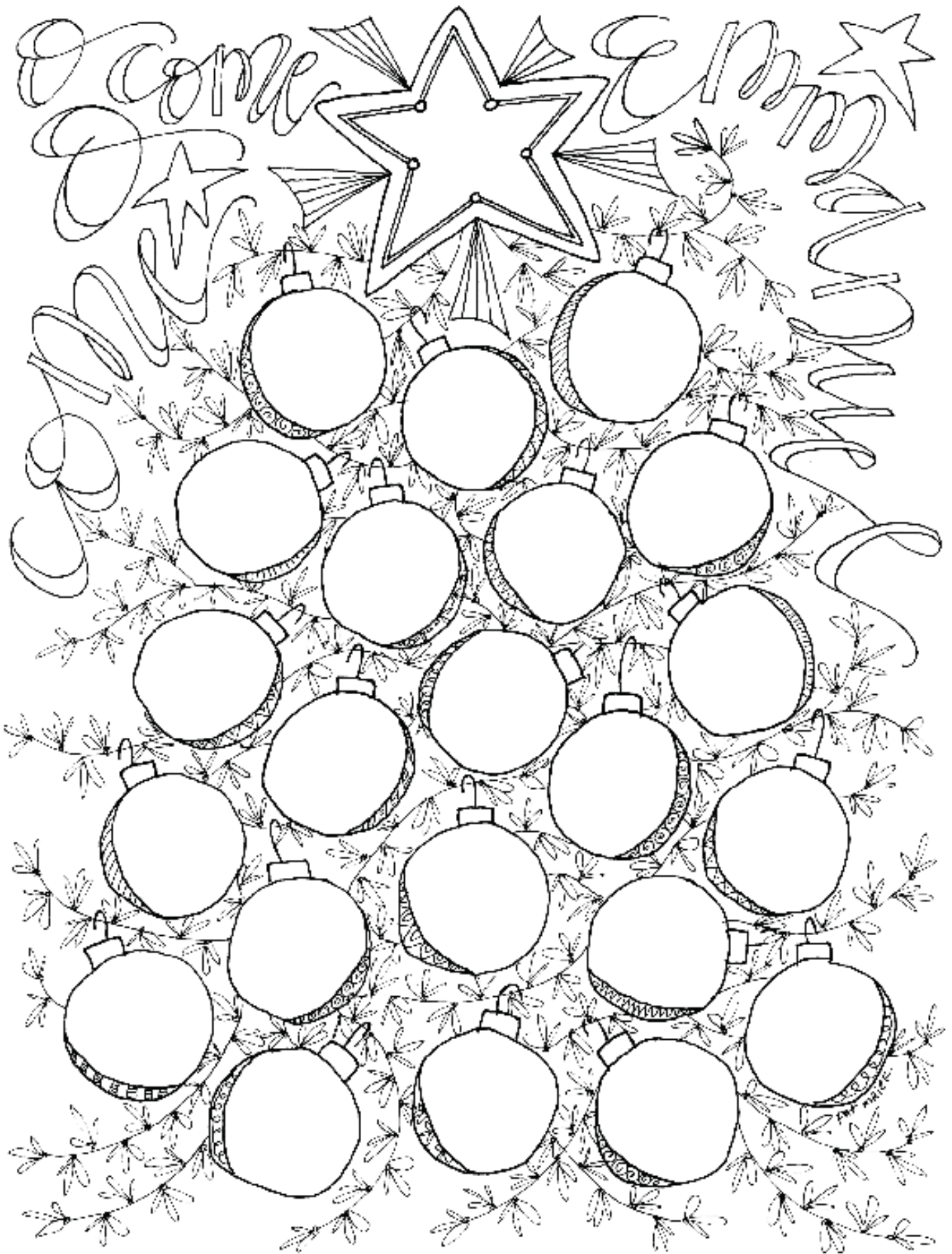
The Advent wreath is the circle of candles (and/or evergreen branches) that you see in the sanctuary during the season of Advent. Some Advent wreaths hang from the ceiling of the sanctuary while others are placed on a floor stand. Either way, the Advent wreath is one of the many beautiful things you’ll see around the church during Advent.

How do we use the advent wreath?

It used to be that the Advent wreath was used in the home to help count the four weeks of Advent. Now you can find them in homes as well as in the church sanctuary. Each Sunday in Advent, a new candle on the wreath is lit. For example, during the first week in Advent, only one candle is lit. During the second week in Advent, two candles are lit. We do this to remember and prepare for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ, the Light of the World!



Parents: Before or after the Divine Service, allow your children to walk up to get a better look at the Advent wreath. Remind them to be reverent in God’s holy places. During this Advent season, try utilizing an Advent wreath at home with family devotions. If you are unsure how to get started, ask your pastor for help.
